A BILL

Making appropriations for the Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2023, and for other purposes.

- 3 That the following sums are appropriated, out of any

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money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, for the 1 2 Legislative Branch for the fiscal year ending September 3 30, 2023, and for other purposes, namely:

(1) reviewed the supply chain risk for the infor mation systems against criteria developed by NIST
 to inform acquisition decisions for high or moderate
 impact information systems within the Federal Gov ernment;

6 (2) reviewed the supply chain risk from the pre7 sumptive awardee against available and relevant
8 threat information provided by the Federal Bureau
9 of Investigation and other appropriate agencies; and

10 (3) in consultation with the Federal Bureau of 11 Investigation or other appropriate Federal entity, 12 conducted an assessment of any risk of cyber-espio-13 nage or sabotage associated with the acquisition of 14 such telecommunications equipment for inclusion in 15 a high or moderate impact system, including any 16 risk associated with such system being produced, 17 manufactured, or assembled by one or more entities 18 identified by the United States Government as pos-19 ing a cyber threat, including but not limited to, 20 those that may be owned, directed, or subsidized by 21 the People's Republic of China, the Islamic Republic 22 of Iran, the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, 23 or the Russian Federation.

(b) None of the funds appropriated or otherwisemade available under this Act may be used to acquire a

high or moderate impact information system reviewed and
 assessed under subsection (a) unless the head of the as sessing entity described in subsection (a) has—

4 (1) developed, in consultation with NIST and
5 supply chain risk management experts, a mitigation
6 strategy for any identified risks;

7 (2) determined, in consultation with NIST and
8 the Federal Bureau of Investigation, that the acqui9 sition of such telecommunications equipment for in10 clusion in a high or moderate impact system is in

8 AUTHORITY TO HIRE INDIVIDUALS COVERED BY THE 9 DEFERRED ACTION FOR CHILDHOOD ARRIVALS PROGRAM 10 SEC. 213. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, an entity may use amounts appropriated or otherwise 11 12 made available under this Act to pay the compensation 13 of an officer or employee without regard to the officer's or employee's immigration status if the officer or employee 14 15 has been issued an employment authorization document under the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals Pro-16 17 gram of the Secretary of Homeland Security, established 18 pursuant to the memorandum from the Secretary of 19 Homeland Security entitled "Exercising Prosecutorial 20Discretion with Respect to Individuals Who Came to the 21 United States as Children", dated June 15, 2012.

This Act may be cited as the "Legislative Branch Ap-propriations Act, 2023".
